This Sunday at St. Paul's, we will be celebrating the festival of Candlemas (and I get to indulge my love of candles in church, hurray!). Once again we will read the story of Simeon and Anna who encounter Jesus in the temple on the day of his presentation (Luke 2:22-40). The lectionary pairs that gospel reading with Malachi 3 where we read that 'the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple'. This ancient promise is fulfilled as Mary presents Jesus for his naming and circumcision, as well as her own purification after childbirth. I'll say more about the Gospel reading on Sunday but for now, let's take a look at Malachi as he is a prophet we hear little from in the lectionary.

Malachi belongs to the group of 'minor prophets' in the Old Testament and the book is set in the period after the people of God had returned from their exile in Babylon and had begun to rebuild their lives, their city and their temple. Understandably, the people are asking themselves whether they were still God's chosen people after the traumatic events of the exile.

Malachi reminds them that their story has yet to reach its conclusion. The Lord, he says, will come 'like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap' to change them, to help them to conform more closely to God's imagination of them. In particular, says Malachi, God will judge those who oppress the hired workers do not defend the widow and the orphan, and thrust aside the alien (as per the Deuteronomic laws laid down generations before). This theme, that God's love is for everyone regardless of status or heritage, runs through our Bibles from the very start and reaches its conclusion in Jesus. On Sunday, we will have a chance to reflect on what this means for us as Christians in today's world. Do come along, light a candle, be surrounded by the beautiful Candlemas liturgy, and prepare yourself to turn from the crib towards the cross as we lay aside Christmas and Epiphany and begin our journey towards Lent.
