

Dear all

Last weekend I was kindly invited to lead at preach at a service of Holy Communion at St. Nic's, Allington. A couple of months ago, you may remember that we held a joint service with St. Nic's here at St. Paul's to pray for the process of choosing a new leader, and I was asked to speak on one of my favourite topics which is how a congregation might best think about supporting a new incumbent. The point I made then was that clergy training has been improved and refined over the years by the dioceses, such that most of us feel well prepared (at least in theory) to become the new leader of a parish after an interregnum, *but* no attention seems to be paid to helping congregations think through the process of welcoming a new leader in a healthy and helpful way.

The leadership team at St. Nic's said that they felt my advice would be helpful to their congregation at large and so I was asked to give a version of my talk last Sunday, and I was able to weave it in quite nicely with some thoughts about 'Thomas the Doubter' from John's Gospel which happened to be the lectionary passage. For those of you who missed it here at St. Paul's, here's a much briefer version of that same advice for a congregation welcoming a new leader:

- SPACE It can be difficult to get used to being in a new place. Whilst it's brilliant if people are welcoming, it's also easy for a new incumbent to feel overwhelmed so please give them a little space to settle in.
- TIME A new leader will not know everything about us and our churches straight away. Of course they have read the parish profiles, but it takes time for 'real' stories to emerge; it's not a process that can be rushed so please give them time.
- FREEDOM The really great thing about a new person is that they come with fresh eyes and will see possibilities that we won't see, and so it's really unhelpful for them to hear things like, 'That'll never work', or 'We tried that before and it failed'. Let's give them the freedom to explore fresh ideas or even revisit old ones
- PATIENCE By the same token, it may be that a new leader decides not to change things for a bit while they work out what to prioritise. We may find this frustrating, especially if we've been waiting for the new incumbent to come along and alter something we really don't like, but let's be patient and allow them to work things out in their own way.
- PERMISSION Lastly, it's really important that we give the person permission to fail. They may very well try
 something that doesn't work so let's be kind if that does happen. Permission to fail is really important
 because it encourages boldness and creative thinking. If we are too quick to put them on a pedestal and tell
 them that they're perfect, the law of unintended consequences will mean that they will end up being wary
 of trying anything slightly risky, worried about disappointing us.

I'll be back with you this Sunday so if you'd like to talk about any of these ideas further, please grab me after the service. The next round of interviews for the post are scheduled for early June so let's all pray for a really positive outcome for our churches.
