Dear All

Last Sunday I spoke about the emotional turmoil the disciples must have been feeling after Jesus' crucifixion, and how this played into their inability to recognise the risen Christ, either on the road to Emmaus or in the upper room. I said that when we are in a state of great sadness, depression, disappointment or vulnerability, the human brain has a tendency to make us hear what we expect to hear and see what we expect to see. I didn't have time to make the argument from the other direction, but I think it's important that I do because our judgement can be just as impaired when it feels as though things are going really **well** too, even in church.

It seems as though this is what happened during the height of the Soul Survivor success. The movement had gained unprecedented momentum, thousands of young people were coming to faith, and the leader of Soul Survivor, Mike Pilavachi, was hailed as a hero, spiritual father and mentor to a generation. However, what we now believe is that he was abusing many young people, certainly psychologically and spiritually, and likely in other ways too. These young people felt that they could not speak out because they had a sense that the movement was being 'breathed on by God' and they could not bring themselves to be the ones to stem the tide of this divine work. Even when one or two brave souls did finally speak out, they were shut down and told that they were immature and that this was not a matter of concern. The truth was that Pilavachi was so 'successful' and held so much sway by this time, he seemed untouchable. People were hearing what they wanted to hear and seeing what they wanted to see.

If you've ever rolled your eyes at having to jump through hoops with regards to safeguarding and safer recruitment (and to be honest, who hasn't?), I do think you'll have a different mindset having watched this. It isn't a happy watch, but I do think it's really important.
