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Dear all

I have been reflecting this week on the difference between the celebration of Easter in this country versus the way we do it in orthodox countries like Cyprus where my family are from. Of course there is the obvious difference that we celebrate on different days; we are currently still in Lent in Cyprus; we have to wait until 5th May for Easter Sunday because the religious calendar used is the Julian one whereas in the west, we use the Gregorian calendar. I must admit that as a child, I was delighted that I had two chances to chomp on Easter eggs every year when all my English friends only had one!

However, the biggest difference for me is around religious literacy. I'm sad to say that we don't do as well as Cyprus in this regard, at least not once we step outside of our church circles. For example, when I have been telling my clients about Archbishop Justin's visit to Maidstone deanery in Holy Week, most people have said to me, "What's Holy Week?". By contrast, you couldn't be in Cyprus though in the week leading up to Easter without knowing that something *very special* was about to happen. There is a general air of festivity, and the smell of baking is everywhere as people prepare to break the strict vegan fast of Lent. Eggs are hard boiled and dyed bright colours in preparation for games on Sunday, and everywhere is a hive of activity.

The vast majority of people go to church too...many times during the week in fact! Late in the evening on Holy Saturday, bonfires are lit and church bells are rung, calling everyone to come and celebrate the resurrection of Christ. Each person has a candle and just before midnight, the lights in the church are extinguished as the choir sings the story of the three women who came to the tomb only to find it empty. The priest emerges with his own lit candle and the flame is passed from one person to another. The liturgy continues outside for another 30 minutes before resuming inside for HOURS!!! To be honest, most people slip away early eat the traditional meal of soup with family and friends, quite understandably.

The real feasting begins around lunchtime on Sunday and can last until Tuesday evening! The Cypriots certainly know how to party! Back here in Maidstone, I'm guessing that most of us have had a slightly less exuberant Easter (except perhaps Allert and Rosemary whose son was getting married), but whatever you did and whoever you did it with, I hope you had a great time celebrating the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. *Christos anesti!*
