7 May 1994 – Dr George Carey ordains women for the first time in Canterbury

Dear all

I have very good news for you all this week. It's that time of year again when Canterbury Cathedral gear themselves up for the ordination season, and this year we seem to have a bumper crop! Archbishop Justin will be ordaining 20 deacons (including our own placement student Robin if he passes his last essay!) and Bishop Rose will be ordaining 6 priests. Please pray for all these people, for the communities that they have been called to serve, and for the whole people of God, lay or ordained, that we may be equipped to love and serve in name of Christ. The ordination ceremony takes place on 29th June at 2.30pm and all are welcome to attend.

A couple of weekends ago, there was another special ceremony held at the cathedral to mark 30 years since the ordination of the first women priests in the diocese. Unfortunately, as it was held on a Saturday I was unable to attend, but most of the women priests in the diocese did, and they were invited to wear their robes and process. Other major roles in the service were carried out by women too; there was an all-female verger team and singing by the girls' choir. My friends who were they said that it was a really joyous occasion.

However, all of this good news is, for me, tinged with some sadness. The situation in the Church of England as a whole is not so welcoming in that not all of its roles are *open* to women. Individual churches are even allowed to pass resolutions saying that they do not want a female vicar or indeed the oversight of a female bishop, and plenty do (including in our own deanery). For some, it will be because they do not believe that the Church of England has the authority to ordain women, for others, it is because they believe (apparently on theological grounds) that God created men to be leaders and women to have only a supporting role in this endeavour.

The thing is though there is an inherent unfairness at play here. Individual female priests themselves do *not* have the right to ask for the oversight of an alternative bishop who *does* support the ordination of women if they find themselves in a diocese with a bishop who doesn't. The whole set up seems hideously unfair to me. The last time the Church of England produced statistics (2020), a third of ordained clergy were women and I'm sure that number has risen since. I glad to say that we are really lucky in Canterbury; our bishop is a woman as you know, and we have a high number of women clergy in the diocese. Fortunately, both St. Paul's and St. Nic's are very open to women clergy (and indeed men!) so let's all pray very hard that someone fabulous is even now filling in their application form for our vacancy, attracted by our inclusive and welcoming churches!
