#### Dear all

X-Factor began on British television in 2004 and it seemed that most contestants only ever wanted to become famous singers, their whole life, ever since they were two or three. Some had great voices and others had charisma and charm with a voice that may not have matched. I must admit, for me it became a cliché phrase, as though saying, "That's all I ever wanted," was enough to get through to the next round. I guess I stopped watching X-Factor when Britain's Got Talent became more popular as Saturday night viewing. Today career choices have changed again. Not many people are saying they want to be an influencer, Youtuber, I guess they are just getting on with it with some degree of success or not. Are there some career choices that are more favoured today than others?

This week's reading comes from Matthew 9.9-13. Matthew first appears in chapter nine of the Gospel of Matthew, where he is sitting at a tax booth. Jesus simply says, "follow me" and Matthew obeyed the call to follow, becoming one of Jesus' disciples. Many of Jesus' disciples, including Matthew, were unpopular choices because of their careers or social standing in the Jewish culture. When Jesus called Matthew to follow him, Matthew was a tax collector. This was a frowned upon profession by most Jews at the time, not because of the idea of taxes but because tax collectors worked for the Roman Empire, which had put extensive pressure on the Jewish people.

It is important to note that Matthew did not choose Jesus, Jesus chose Matthew. None of us chooses Jesus, he chooses us. And Jesus did not ask him if he would take some time to think about the possibility of considering going along with him. The call to follow is in the imperative mood, which is the mood of command. At the command of Jesus, Matthew got up and followed him. Jesus calls Matthew to "follow after" him.

With the other disciples, Matthew spread Jesus' message throughout the Middle East. Some extra-biblical traditions teach that Matthew extended his ministry to Ethiopia, where he was eventually martyred.

Many people who are not Christians today believe that following Jesus would be too costly and definitely boring. What would you say to someone who thought that?
